LETTER FROM THE **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR**

2024 was a year unlike any other in the history of Tomorrow's Women. The war in Gaza took the lives of three of our alumni. We mourn them deeply. They were daughters, sisters, and leaders—voices of hope, now silenced.

In the wake of escalating violence, our team pivoted. We launched trauma-informed virtual gatherings, one-onone therapy, and provided direct humanitarian support. In this space of rupture, we discovered some of our most meaningful work.

While grief has marked this year, so too has resilience. Even under unimaginable strain, our staff, alumni, and young participants continued to meet in dialogue, practice compassionate listening, and map out a future beyond destruction—a future marked by moral imagination and ambition.

We are not untouched by loss. But we remain unwavering in our belief that peace is built through the courage of young individuals daring to connect when the world divides.

We are also grateful to honor a significant leadership transition: Tony Gerlicz completed his term as board president, passing the torch to longtime board member Lamia Faruki. We thank Tony for his steady leadership and welcome Lamia's vision and personal connection to our mission.

Thank you for standing with us, and this next generation of young women leaders.

We envision a world where young women in Israel and Palestine become leaders who work together toward a society where equality, justice, and peace prevail, and the occupation ends.

OUR METHODOLOGY: WHY US, WHY NOW

Tomorrow's Women's tested methodology weaves together four core elements: trauma healing, storytelling, cross-cultural dialogue, and leadership skills development. We introduce these tools during the identity-forming period of adolescence and young adulthood to create maximum impact.

Through compassionate listening, creative expression, and facilitated encounters, young women learn to lead from empathy, strength, and vision as they go on to become journalists, educators, nonprofit founders, entrepreneurs, civic leaders, and more.

Since the start of the war, the work of bridge-building has become both more difficult and more essential. The courage our participants show in continuing to engage during active conflict demonstrates the profound possibility of our methodology, our community, and our team.

MEETING THE MOMENT



We received a significant USAID MEPPA grant validating Tomorrow's Women's methodology, commitment to our alumni, and ability to deliver impact despite ongoing war.¹



We hosted our inaugural Alumni Leadership Summit in Santa Fe, NM bringing together young women to reconnect and double down on their shared commitment to building a better future.



PARTICIPANT DEMOGRAPHICS




A NOTE FROM OUR PALESTINIAN AND ISRAELI CO-DIRECTORS

Even in the face of unimaginable violence, fear, and loss, we continued our work because we know the importance of showing up, especially during times of crisis.

During this year of war we had several remarkable achievements: We recruited 60 brave young women (Palestinians and Jewish Israelis) to learn Hebrew and Arabic, explore media as a tool for activism, and become dialogue facilitators. We stood with our alumni, collecting their stories and bearing witness to their suffering and strength. We supported our 2023 Teen Leadership Program participants as their relationships were abruptly severed. And we designed and held our first-ever Alumni Summit—a pivotal accomplishment that brought generations of Tomorrow's Women activists together to deepen their work, even during wartime.

At every turn, we were renewed by the young women themselves: In the face of war and loss, they choose compassion over polarization, vision over vengeance. The war has tried to separate and silence us—but we know hope is the path and change is possible, even now. Especially now.

WARTIME PROGRAMMING: HOLDING THE LINE

ADVANCED LEADERSHIP INITIATIVE

Alumni Leadership Summit

Our inaugural Alumni Leadership Summit was held in Santa Fe, NM. The retreat focused on trauma healing, storytelling, leadership skills-building, and citizen (Track II) diplomacy unofficial communication channels and conflict resolution programs between ordinary citizens that address historical traumas and build relationships that result in more durable and robust co-resistance.

Results reported by participants:


- Have more skills and tools to be a leader/ activist/peacemaker
- Have greater ability to build authentic relationships with people from different cultures
- Are more able to resolve conflicts

100% Have a better understanding of the challenges people on "the other side" of the conflict face


"Big change is hard...but we can make small changes in our personal lives and help each other. If you change someone's life it's like you've changed a whole world."

Community **Dialogue Projects**

After returning home from the Alumni Leadership Summit, participants put their dialogue facilitation skills into action by hosting dialogue circles with their friends, families, and community members. Locations of the dialogue circles are illustrated on this map.



We began with a reflection on a recent serious incident, which involved two students from the community. Many participants expressed feelings of sadness, depression, and fear...We discussed techniques to identify and handle emotional triggers and participants shared stories of successes or challenges...Each person was encouraged to continue tracking their triggers, practicing self-care, and engaging in reflective listening." - Rosol, West Bank Palestinian and alum dialogue circle facilitator

Most people who participated in the dialogue were people who only very recently came back home after a year of being evacuated. A lot of them lost jobs, loved ones, any sense of stability, and mostly hope...We talked about our hopes as a kibbutz and the impact of the young generation and I felt very proud to call this place and these amazing people my home." - Omri, Jewish Israeli and alum dialogue circle facilitator

[5] I asked the [participants] to think about the last two bad situations that happened to them...I gave everyone the safety and space to express whatever they wanted and after each story there were questions and comments and advice. The main aim was to teach them to express themselves and think deeply about whether they react to their problems in a healthy way or not. I believe this is useful, because in our region we are not used to sharing, expressing, and thinking about our problems in a deeper way." - Mayar, West Bank Palestinian and alum dialogue circle facilitator



Speaking Engagements

Tomorrow's Women alumni brought their voices to audiences across eight U.S. cities, including at key forums like the Democratic Women's Congressional Caucus. They also addressed international audiences at events including a parallel event to the U.N. Commission on the Status of Women and an International Day of the Girl celebration hosted by Together Women Rise.



U.S. PEACE AMBASSADORS PROGRAM

American teenagers built skills in compassionate listening, emotional intelligence, self confidence, teamwork, conflict resolution, and activism. They also engaged virtually and in-person with peers in Israel and Palestine, including conducting interviews with Gaza Girls alumni who courageously shared their experiences of war—stories of displacement, loss, survival, and strength.

Peace Ambassadors reported measurable growth:

COLLECTIVE PROCESSING AND HEALING

Tomorrow's Women facilitators led uni-national meetings to process trauma and grieve together. While the gatherings were uni-national, our 2023 Palestinian and Israeli participants chose courage over separation: They exchanged letters with one another, building on the bi-national bonds they created despite the war raging around them.

Licensed therapists also offered pro-bono, one-on-one therapy sessions in Arabic, Hebrew, and English for any alumni or staff who needed support in the wake of October 7th and the subsequent, ongoing war.

GAZA RELIEF

Tomorrow's Women raised emergency funds for Gaza Girls alumni, distributing money to every alumni. Several Gaza Girls alumni courageously shared their stories of survival and displacement, reaching audiences online and across the U.S. during Tomorrow's Women speaking events.



A TRIBUTE TO LEADERSHIP

This year marks the end of Tony Gerlicz's presidency of the board. Under his leadership, Tomorrow's Women grew in scope, reach, and global impact. Tony guided us through a pandemic, a legacy-building campaign, and now a war. We are deeply thankful.

We are proud to welcome Lamia Faruki as our new board president beginning in 2025. Lamia has served on the board for more than a decade, and her Palestinian heritage and commitment to justice shape her approach to this work. As she said in her acceptance remarks: "When people ask, 'How can you do this work now?' I respond: 'How can we not?" I'm proud to work with Tomorrow's Women's fiercely committed and hardworking team as we navigate these unprecedented times together." - Lamia Faruki


MOVEMENT AND CAPACITY BUILDING: OUR TEAM IN ACTION

Our team expanded Tomorrow's Women's influence across civil society and policy forums. Staff brought our mission to international peacebuilding conferences in Geneva and Berlin. We contributed perspectives at the Van Leer Jerusalem Institute's Political Imagination Workshop and the Common Bond Institute's 3rd Side Conference. Our voices reached the highest policy levels when staff and alumni presented to the U.S. Congres-sional Democratic Women's Caucus and met with U.S. Assistant Secretary of State Barbara Leaf on women's role in conflict resolution. These interconnected efforts help us weave a stronger network to nurture the next generation of Palestinian, Israeli, and U.S. women leaders.



LOOKING AHEAD TO 2025

With ongoing conflict in Palestine and Israel and concerning global shifts away from gender equity, we remain steadfastly committed to our mission and, more than ever, driven to act. We hold firm to our foundational belief that investing in young women's leadership creates the clearest path toward a more stable, just reality.

We are doubling our programming in 2025. Our signature six-month Teen Leadership Program for teens from Israel and Palestine will start with several in-person seminars on gender issues, personal narratives, and critical thinking and will culminate in Switzerland in partnership with Coexistences, where the cohort will forge new skills and make lasting connections with "the other side" on historic neutral territory. The Peace Ambassadors will learn emotional intelligence, resilience, and compassionate communication, while producing an original podcast as their capstone project.

We're also deepening our commitment to alumni with our second annual Alumni Leadership Summit in New Mexico and visits to a dozen cities on speaking tours across the U.S. On the ground in Palestine and Israel, we're launching robust programming on trauma healing, language skills, conflict analysis and resolution training, and more.

The war has changed us, but it has not broken us. The mission continues—not as idealism, but as necessity.
